First Weekend

First Weekend kicks off the 2010 season at Pinewoods Camp, running from June 18th-20th. First Weekend is a family-friendly session welcoming all ages. The co-chairs this year, Donna Bednar and Ronni Olitsky, are busy organizing an exciting program with something for every member of the family. The weekend begins Friday with dinner in the dining hall overlooking beautiful Long Pond followed by an evening dance for all in the open-air dance pavilion, C#. There will be music and dancing from both American and English traditions at the evening dances.

Each day begins with Morning Gathering for the entire camp where staff and campers share stories, song and dance. Campers are encouraged to share their talents at First Weekend by participating in Morning Gathering and/or by leading a class of their own design. The day will continue with age-appropriate staff and camper-led sessions. Pinewoods has not one but two beautiful ponds for your enjoyment. We will have two swim times each day, weather permitting. There will be a certified life guard with an assistant present during each swim session. The evening dances begin with family dances that are accessible and fun for all members of the family. Half way through the evening the youngest children are escorted to bed. The evening dance continues with a program that builds in intensity and complexity. Pinewoods is a big place, parents that want to return to the dance after tucking in their little ones may want to bring a good set of walkie-talkies. We hope to find willing teenage babysitters to patrol camp after the youngest campers have gone to bed.

This year's staff includes dance leaders Barbara Finney and Steve Zakon-Anderson. There will be music by Jennifer Armstrong, Doug Creighton, Paul Friedman, and Susan Janssen. Nancy Knight will be organizing a pre-school music and games

session. Bettie Zakon-Anderson will be teaching a crafts class. First Weekend has a rich history of camper-led activities including ritual dance, percussive dance, Irish sets, round singing, dance band, Broadway sing-a-long, etc. If you have an idea for a session you want to lead or a request for something in particular, feel free to let us know. Your expertise and enthusiasm will help to fill out the schedule! We encourage campers to bring musical instruments to camp. In addition to the dance band class, there are jam sessions and other musical happenings occurring throughout the weekend.

Fees for adult CDS-Boston members are \$175 and \$200 for non-members. The rates decrease for younger ages. A flyer and application with further details are included in this newsletter and posted on the CDS Boston website www.cds-boston.org.

July 4th

Are you ready to start making plans for your summer? Mark your calendar! CDS-BC's July 4th weekend at Pinewoods Camp will be held July 1 to July 5, 2010. The session starts with dinner on Thursday night, includes four evening dances and three full days of English and American dance classes, along with ritual dancing, singing, and something new: Bollywood dance. The weekend ends with breakfast and farewells on Monday morning. Pinewoods Camp provides delicious meals, rustic cabins, open-air dance pavilions, wonderful swimming ponds, and a beautiful and relaxing natural setting. But of course, it is people that make this such a special event.

English country dance leaders for the July 4th weekend are Helene Cornelius and Joanna Reiner, with Lisa Greenleaf leading American contras. The ritual dance staff features Judy Erickson, dance creator for Orion Longsword and the current fearless leader of the Boston Centre, teaching an advanced clog routine and an innovative approach to traditional Morris dancing. Olivia Barrand will be teaching a beginning clog class based on her experience in England studying with Pat Tracey. Laurie Cumming, of Toronto Sword, will teach longsword. Aiden Carey, DIRT award winning rapper dancer, will teach a class on dance creation for intermediate to advanced rapper dancers. Erica Morse will teach a traditional Cotswold Morris class and accompany classes, as well. Lily Leahy will lead a workshop in Harmony singing and give us an opportunity to dance Irish Sets during a "One shot." Jamie Beaton and John Mayberry will lead singing on the Camphouse porch, and will likely run into the Bolero brothers and bring them along, as well. Laura Sprung will lead Ye Olde Crafte Tyme in the Camphouse, for those who want a change of pace.

Top-quality live music will be provided by some of Boston Centre's best musicians. Bare Necessities (Jacqueline Schwab, Peter Barnes, Mary Lea and Earl Gaddis) will be joined by Dave Langford, Karen Axelrod, Daniel Beerbohm, Eric Morse and Alan Dodson. All classes feature live music. There will be a musical "One Shot" for couple dancing or the pleasure of listening.

The nights continue after the last waltz of the evening. Late-night sessions traditionally include pub night, skit night, and more dancing, jamming and singing, with snacks and libations for all.

This year we are highlighting some of the talents of our staff that do not fit completely under the definition of English and American traditional music and dance. Our staff is multi-talented and we feel their skills should be capitalized upon.

Laurie Cumming has been studying Bollywood dance in Toronto. She gave us a taste last year at Ogontz Camp and will be offering a class in this style of dance. The hugely talented Peter Barnes has been willing to work with her to provide us with appropriate music, whatever that is.

Karen Axelrod has a specialty beyond fine musicianship. For a number of years, she was a member of The Villa Jidiots, a comedy improv group based in Northampton, Massachusetts. She has agreed to do a Comedy Improv "One Shot," which we promise will be vastly entertaining.

If you are interested in attending this year's July 4th Weekend at Pinewoods, please see the enclosed registration form, also available on the CDS-Boston website. This session is generally full by the lottery deadline, so plan accordingly. Just a reminder, there is no gender balancing in admission decisions, and those that apply together must all be members to be considered for priority admission at the time of the lottery.

Arts Council Funding for EFDSS

A Note from English Folk Dance Society,
(EFDSS) October 2009 (United Kingdom)

The EFDSS has become a Regularly Funded Organisation (RFO) of the Arts Council England (ACE). This status accompanies a grant of £400,000 spread over the period October 2009 to March 2011 for the primary development of folk music in England. It is recognition of the status of EFDSS within the folk arts and in particular the positive developments it has achieved over the past two years with projects such as Take 6.

The funding from the Music Department of ACE follows the sector survey which they undertook in March and April of this year. The outcome of this survey is to focus funding in four areas — Artists' Development, Sectoral Development, Communications and Information, and Education and Learning — with a further specification that Sectoral Development should include a folk industry conference in 2010 and Communications and Information should include the development of an on-line directory.

EFDSS was invited to apply for this funding in June 2009 and was informed of the success of its application at the end of September. Our programme starts immediately and runs to the end of March 2011 will include a number of specific projects under the four headings listed above, together with over-arching developments such as networking and advocacy. While the focus is on music development we expect some aspects of the programme to impact positively on the folk arts sector as a whole. We will seek to work in partnership wherever possible with other folk organisations, arts organisations and, in particular, the education sector across the country.

EFDSS will have the opportunity to apply for a further three years of funding (2011-2014) in the autumn of 2010.

Six “New Generation Initiative” Dance Camp Scholarships Offered

For the fourth year, “New Generation Initiative” (NGI) scholarships will be offered to attend CDS Boston Centre dance sessions at Pinewoods Camp: First Weekend, July 4th, English-Scottish, and Labor Day Weekend. Pinewoods Camp makes the full scholarships possible by waiving its fees, and CDS Boston Centre matches by waiving its fees for six campers.

The scholarship program was initiated by Pinewoods Camp in 2007, in collaboration with its four dance-association user-groups. The program aims to increase the opportunity for young people and young adults to experience dance and music programs at Pinewoods and its wider community of dance, music, and dance leadership.

The scholarships are for teens and young adults through the age of 30 years. Teenagers must be old enough to be admitted as an adult to a camp session, an age that varies from session to session (full details are in each camp session's application). Preference will be given to those who are new to Pinewoods camp, have financial need, have enthusiasm or talent for dance, and a desire to participate fully. We also hope that the recipients' dance camp experiences will aid them in sharing dance's possibilities with their community, and perhaps, over time, introducing others into the community of dance.

Since the people we most desire to apply for a scholarship may not be aware of these scholarships, we ask that all members of *(cont. p6)*

Dave Stryker Send-A-Young-Dancer-To-England Fund

In memory of David McCauley Stryker 1958-2007

Established by Dave’s family, friends and fellow Morris dancers and musicians, this scholarship assists one young Morris dancer and/or musician per year with a cash award of up to \$500 to travel to England with a Morris team for dancing and study. Requires a demonstrated need for financial aid. The purpose is to help someone get to England who otherwise might not be able to afford it.

Applications are due by June 1, 2009. Award is announced by June 15. If the trip has already occurred this year, the scholarship may be awarded retroactively.

The application form contains the rest of the qualifying and contact information, and is a separate sheet enclosed in this newsletter.

David McCauley Stryker Jr. may have carried no official or professional title, but for many in Greater Boston and beyond, he was unquestionably King of the May -- at least, of the annual May Day celebration that has been held in Cambridge, Mass., on the banks of the Charles River every May 1 for the past three decades. Dave Stryker died a little more than a month after May Day, on June 6, 2007, having battled cancer for the last year and a half.

Dave was a man who was truly larger than life. Dave’s singular dancing and personality were well known throughout the US, Canada and UK. Dave danced and played officially on at least 5 teams and unofficially on many more. He toured England numerous times, both with teams and solo, because he loved to study Morris dance and music at its source. He played numerous instruments of Morris, including: fiddle, accordion, concertina, banjo and guitar.

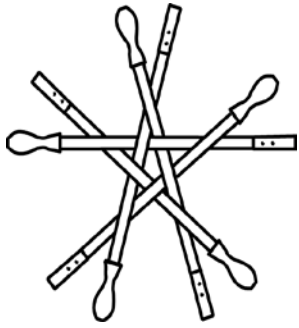

Legacies of Helen Storrow Girl Scouts and Country Dance

Five Senior Girl Scouts from Falmouth MA will be traveling to Adelboden Switzerland this summer, to attend a program at "Our Chalet", a Girl Scout World Center. Among other things, they will be teaching country dance to approximately 100 participants to illustrate their local heritage. Why country dance? Thanks to sleuthing by Jan Elliott, the troop discovered that country dance, Girl Scouts and "Our Chalet" are all linked through Helen Storrow, one of the founding members of CDS Boston Centre. Helen was an early supporter of the Girl Scouting movement, and donated property at Long Pond in Plymouth for a Girl Scout camp and for what is now Pinewoods Camp. In addition, Helen donated "Our Chalet", the troop's destination in Switzerland, to the international Girl Scouting movement. Two of the Girl Scouts are active members of Vineyard Swordfish and Clownfish Rapper Sword Team (Woods Hole) and have spent time at both camps. The connections were too many to ignore!

The Girl Scouts have been working hard for more than three years to earn money for this trip through traditional Girl Scout fundraisers (cookie sales) and other projects. There are several significant projects before the Board this year. One major project is the CDS-BC archives. CDS-BC has shared an office with the New England Folk Festival Association, and Folk Arts Center of New England for many years. Marcie Van Cleave, Executive Director of FAC, was informed in the Fall of 2009 that the building housing the present office had been sold and that the new owner intended to turn the property into a parking lot.

There is a huge amount of historical material, carefully preserved and organized by George Fogg, dating back to the 1915 founding of the Country Dance Society, Boston Centre. George has been adding materials related to CDS-BC and NEFFA to the archives for many years from a variety of sources, including his own collecting, donations from people connected with the Society, subscriptions to other organizations' publications, and so on. There is a large record collection (mainly 78 RPM discs); many dance books and pamphlets; diaries from people central to the Society; many, many photographs; etc.

Some records, such as the financial registers and other internal documents from prior decades, which few people desire to access, are scheduled to go to the New Hampshire Library of Traditional Music & Dance at the University of New Hampshire, Durham. This Library already houses the archives of Pinewoods Camp, the Country Dance and Song Society, Ralph Page, Ted Sannella, Larry Jennings, and many others. Such archival collections provide a secure location under good management, and make materials available to anyone, including researchers and historians. Their web page is: <http://www.library.unh.edu/special/index.php/category/folk-music-dance> The Traditional Music & Dance collection is a part of the much larger Milne Special Collections at the University of New Hampshire.

While NEFFA has decided to cease having an office, and discontinuing the joint office-sharing arrangement, the CDS-BC Board has discussed the need for an office and feels that, although the amount of space we have been renting to date is not required, having an independent location has merit. We do have records that must be kept for legal reasons.

We do own some equipment (costumes, swords, fans, etc.). Keeping the Society's materials in someone's basement or closet runs the risk of them being forgotten, disappearing, becoming disorganized, unavailable, and so on.

CDS-BC has a lot of great material that members would find interesting. George Fogg gives us glimpses with his historical notes for the newsletter and document displays for special occasions. If materials of interest such as books, photos and history were more accessible to the membership, would people use them more? We are thinking about what constitutes "accessible to the membership" and "materials of interest". Potential projects for making the archives more accessible might include digitizing some materials, putting photographs into binders, or continuing the historical record in the Up A Double and Back books (a multi-volume history of the Society up through the '70's) in time for our 100th anniversary in 2015! Your opinions would be appreciated. Please communicate with any Board member, or email comments to president@cds-boston.org.

An important current project relates to financial governance. Thom Yarnal, who moved to the Boston area in 2009, and who has long experience with nonprofit organizations, has been hired by the Board to both document where CDS-BC is with its financial procedures and oversight, and where we need to get to in order to satisfy both legal requirements (state and federal) and meet the test of good governance. Documentation of procedures is an essential part of this effort. Thom will also help us understand best practices for volunteer nonprofits and the expectations from regulators such as the Internal Revenue Service, the Massachusetts Attorney General's Division of Public Charities, and the Secretary of the Commonwealth.

The Board is also devoting attention to the CDS-BC insurance policy, prompted by both Pinewoods Camp's and the Scout House's request for higher coverage amounts, and because the policy has not been reviewed since at least 2005. We have requested quotations for several items: increased coverage limits (rising to \$3 million at Pinewoods Camp's request); financial insurance or a fiduciary bond to protect the Society's financial assets, directors and officer's insurance to cover board members and officers; and changes to the coverage in the general liability policy for incidents relating to boating (at

Pinewoods); sexual molestation and harassment; and a several other subjects. The request by Pinewoods Camp to increase our coverage to a \$3 million liability umbrella policy alone will probably cost in the vicinity of \$1,500 per year. We expect to adjust the price of attending camp sessions accordingly in 2011.

Finally, the Board is compiling a camp-sessions chair handbook as we work with the camp co-chairs going through this year's process of preparing budgets, working with Pinewoods Camp, selecting staff, being at camp, and preparing final reports. Pinewoods has a lot of great information, but there are parts of the process that are CDS-BC's alone. Over the years, CDS-BC's camp documentation has disappeared, so we are compiling guidance, timelines and budget forms, which we intend to make accessible to camp chairs on the Society's website.

As a volunteer organization, we depend not only on the board, but also on you, our members, to make our activities happen, and more generally the dance Society to function.

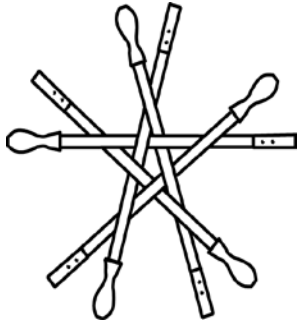

Dancing America Rapper Tournament

or So you think you can rapper dance?

Inspired by the long-running British Dancing England Rapper Tournament (DERT), rapper competition is crossing the pond for the first ever Dancing America Rapper Tournament (DART), October 23, 2010. With DART, we aim to bring together sword teams to celebrate the talent, innovation, and new ideas of sword dancing and honor its deeply rooted traditions. So far, teams will be coming from as far afield as Toronto, New York, St. Paul, Minnesota, Berea, Kentucky, Baltimore, Maryland, Edinburgh, and London. This event, brainchild of the apparently-tireless Tom Kruskal, is organized by Great Meadows Morris & Sword and the Greater Boston sword dance community, with help and sponsorship of CDS Boston Center.

Competition has been a part of the rapper sword tradition from its earliest times in the north of England. "The solidarity between miners in a pit village was exceeded only by the bitter rivalry between adjacent pit villages, sometimes only hundreds of yards apart. This rivalry led to hard-fought competitions between villages, whether in football, handball, pigeon racing, leek growing, chess, rapper or simply drunken brawls in the streets" (www.rapper.org.uk). Cecil B. Sharp helped revive rapper dance in the early 20th century, documenting the dances in "The Sword Dances of Northern England," and teaching and promoting rapper. Rapper was revived, again, after the Second World War by Bill Cassie and students at Kings College in Newcastle who became the Newcastle Kingsmen. Finally in the 1980's the DERT competition helped popularize and spread rapper throughout the English-speaking world. Teams from Great Meadows Morris and Sword (GMMS) have competed at DERT five times, winning their division once, and always coming back brimming with enthusiasm.

While we think it may be best to skip the drunken brawls, the DART weekend does promise to bring the traditional gathering of sword teams to this side of the pond. The competition will be held throughout the afternoon on Saturday, October 23rd, at venues around Kendall Square in Cambridge, MA, including the All Asia, Tommy Doyle's', and the Cambridge Brewing Company. Detailed schedules will be available on the event webpage: www.dart2010.org. Add the spark of competition, strengthen ties, share figures, and watch the teams go!

The Sweet Beat

The traditional dance and music organization Country Dance and Song Society (CDSS) has published *On the Beat with Ralph Sweet*, a 200 plus page book of singing and patter square dances collected by master caller Ralph Sweet during his long career.

The book includes essays on how to call these types of dances, with instructions for the figures, teaching tips, and sequences. The singing squares include music for the accompanying tune, many set to popular songs from the 1930s-

1950s, such as “Barnacle Bill,” “Golden Slippers,” and “Hello Mary Lou”; the “Intros, Breaks, and Endings” section takes the mystery out of calling; “Hoedowns” includes music for suggested tunes to back up a patter-style caller; and “Sources” gives information on the origin of each square in the book.

Ralph Sweet has been a contra and square dancer since 1945, a caller and teacher of dance since 1948; he is owner of the Sweetheart Flute Company, maker of wooden folk flutes and whistles; author of a music book for fifes; recording artist; and owner of the Powder Mill Barn in Enfield, CT, which hosts square dance parties, weddings, auctions, and a dog obedience school. He still dances at, and sometimes calls for the contra dances held at the Guiding Star Grange in Greenfield, MA.

The book’s editor is Nils Fredland, Publications Coordinator for American Dance at CDSS, and a caller who has been studying with Ralph learning the art of singing squares. He calls throughout the USA and with the band, “Elixir”, and is a trained trombonist and singer.

The Country Dance and Song Society, a nonprofit educational organization, has supported traditional American and English dance, music and song since 1915. Its office is in Haydenville, MA. Etiquette of Folk and Square Dancing

“The Rules of The Game”

Chewing gum is not done at a dance or in public anywhere, because it looks most unattractive.

Minimize noise and confusion: come in quietly, talk softly, move around as little as possible, stay put, either sitting or standing.

When the teacher, caller or leader talk, listen. Listen for instructions and do as you are told quickly and quietly. Get into the requested formation at once. Use hand signals to get the required number of people in your set---do not shout for them.

One teacher is the rule. Never try to tell others in your set what to do. Just do the correct thing yourself. If you have done it correctly, and the teacher needs your help, she will ask you to demonstrate.

Once you have joined a set, you never leave it until the leader ends that particular “tip” of dances. In case of a real emergency...and I mean real, you ask the leader to excuse you, so that your place may be filled.

You never cut through a set to get to where you are going.

You add yourself to the end of a longways set.

The most experienced dancers should be in number one position of a set. But after dancing awhile, it is pleasant for everyone to move around so everyone gets a chance to be “head”.

These are people not sticks, with whom you are dancing, and this is a sociable occasion. Look at them, smile at them, learn their names. At the end of a “tip” thank them for an enjoyable dance.

You do not beckon or nod to someone to be your partner; you step up to her and ask her.

You do not walk off and leave your partner on the floor at the end of a “tip”. You walk her to her seat.

This activity is for fun; it is more fun if done correctly; and you will add to your enjoyment and to that of every other member of your set, if you do it correctly. You must not get cross over mistakes - you ignore others’ errors and correct your own.

True courtesy comes from a real love of other

people; a desire to help others to have a good time (including the teacher). This is the key to popularity.

Beyond this is graciousness: express your appreciation for the fun you’ve had to those responsible for it.

I was given the two attached letters from Evelyn Lamond ages ago & as I am rooting thru my piles of dance papers I found them today and thought they might be of interest to ECD'ers of today. - George

January 25, 1943

TO A FEW SELECTED DANCERS!

I have suggested to Miss Chapin that a number of us would like to have a class composed exclusively of experienced dancers, at which we might have a good time doing advanced dances and at the same time benefit by individual criticism. Are you interested?

Such a class could be held either on Mondays, Tuesdays, or Thursdays, twice a month and would not take the place of weekly classes. The cost would be \$3.00 for six lessons for students and dancers already enrolled in another class, and \$450 for others. Demonstration sets would be appointed out of this class and would rehearse briefly after class, to save the necessity of devoting further evenings to such purpose.

At least one such class will be held at 8:30 on Thursday evening, February 4th at 87 Beacon Street (if enough appear, we will move to Brimmer School [around the corner on Brimmer Street]. We will then decide whether or not to continue, and on what nights. If we don't continue, we'll each chip in 50 cents for the one class.

I feel that such a class would be more fun than those in which most of us are held back by beginners, and that we could do more interesting things, even an occasional "ballet".
