

Boston Centre is in a position to help new and developing dance programs in the Greater Boston area (and a ways beyond). We do this in a coouple of ways: with financial support through various Centre funds, and by helping to develop new English and American teachers, musicians, and dancers through workshops and dance programs.

Last fall, we gave financial support to a new English dance group getting started in Taunton, and to a growing contra dance in Medway. We also offered what I hope will become an annual occurrence, a dance leadership workshop. Helene Cornelius and Brad Foster focused on the details of teaching English country dancing. The workshop was quite successful, with attendees from all over New England and New York. Thanks to Rich Jackson for putting it all together!

The Boston Centre's food booth at the New England Folk Festival is our biggest fundraiser. Susannah Shewmaker has agreed to run the booth just one more time. She is desperate to share her experience with someone willing to learn the ropes this year and take over next year. See her article elsewhere in this issue.

Speaking of fundraising: this year, to increase the amount of money available for scholarships to Boston Centre's many Pinewoods weekends, we're holding a drawing for admission for two to any of the sessions. These weekends offer a variety of programs to meet the needs of all dancers, whether it's introducing your family to Pinewoods in a relaxed atmosphere, or an exhausting session of round-the-clock dancing. 

- ★ 1978 Jan. Rich Jackson wandered into Brimmer and May for a Tuesday night dance.
- ♦ 1978 Blizzard of '78 (Feb.) Ha'penny joins the Morris world.
- ★ 1978 Allan Wechsler learned "Hole in the Wall" and "Picking up Sticks" at MIT Folk Dance Club and came to Wed. CDS English dance to learn more!
- ★ 1978 Catherine Wojtowicz: Toronto, Medieval, Renaissance. 1981, Newport, contras. 1985, Boston, English. 1985, Providence, Morris.
- ★ 1979 Terry Gaffney: I started in Liverpool with the EFDSS—laid off till '84 and CDS in Boston—attracted first by the patterns then by depth of contact with other dancers!
- ★ 1980 June. Bruce Mackenzie notices Martha Moore standing out at a Scout House potluck dance. But loses interest in dancing after they get married 8/1/87 (Tony Saletan called at the wedding.)
- ★ 1980 Julia Rubin Smith born Oct. 1980. Started dancing July 1980. Went to Pinewoods Aug. 1981. First dance at age 3!
- ★ 1981 Spring. Robin met Joe at a Longborough Morris workshop at the YWCA before a Wednesday night dance!
- ★ 1981 Spring. Naomi Cameron: After contra dancing since 1975, went to my first English dance workshop. After Pinewoods July 4th, I was hooked.
- ★ 1981 Marie Lessard: AMC/Scandinavian weekend at Pinewoods. Found CDS/NEFFA dances in Boston area shortly thereafter.
- ★ 1981 Keith Spiro began the Wednesday night commute from Portland, Me.
- ★ 1981 Julia Huestis took an English workshop.
- ◆ 1981 August. First Campers Week at Pinewoods.
- ★ 1983 John Wojtowicz started dancing. First shin splints in 1985, during a 45 minute "Petronella" at a dance out on the Cape. Believe it or not, the dance can be done to the theme music from Gilligan's Island!

This year marks a major change in the format of our "ritual" classes, away from weekly series and towards one-day intensive workshops. This enables teachers and dancers from out of town to take part, as well as those who can't make a commitment for several weeks running. We did schedule two series of Morris classes, to try and meet everyone's needs. As we determine attendance patterns at the Saturday workshops, we will try to keep the cost of admission as low as possible while still covering expenses, especially with visiting teachers who require higher fees.

We got off to a rousing start in October with a Wednesday night series of four classes for beginning Morris dancers, taught by Shag Graetz. Based on the Ilmington tradition, the classes gave people a feel for the general style of the Morris, as well as for the special characteristics of the Ilmington dances. Tom Kruskal was the musician.

In November, Tony Poile (of Greenwich Guard) taught an advanced Rapper workshop, with music by Earl Gaddis. Tony focused on accuracy in stepping, consistency of style, and on the use of the Fool and Betty characters. Dancers experimented with different ways to perform figures, and learned a triangular 6-sword lock. The workshop was well-attended, with teams from Massachusetts, Connecticut, and Rhode Island represented.

December brought Ira Bernstein to town to teach three clog mini-workshops. In the open Appalachian class, he focused on style and rhythm, stressing the value of learning a small vocabulary of steps well. The Cape Breton class learned several reel-time steps (well-suited to freestyle clogging at New England contra dances). In the advanced Waltz Clog class, Ira taught several steps from the routines of Sam Sherry, who was a clog dancer in vaudeville. Ruthie Dornfeld provided the music for all three sessions.

Jan Elliott led a workshop for Morris musicians in January. She discussed the use of different instruments, and stressed the importance of imparting energy and rhythm through the music. Participants took turns playing for each other, with comments and suggestions both from Jan and from those dancing.

On Saturday, February 22, English visitor Trevor Stone, publisher of the sword-dance broadside Rattle Up, My Boys, will teach the dropped-step Helmsley longsword dance to experienced dancers. And our six-week Wednesday night Massed Morris series is planned for March and April. Check the enclosed flyers!
